## PETRIFIED PROGRAM

There were 24 attendees at the Petrified Wood Identification Seminar held at the Masonic Lodge in Barstow, sponsored by the Mojave Desert Gem and Mineral Society. **Walt Wright** had the following available to students; highlighters, magnifying loops, hardback and soft back books, a spiral bound handout of 183 pages and a truckload of samples that he passed around for 2.5 days!



Seeing the samples that were being discussed and then shown in books just made the experience more palpable as well as a feast for the eyes. We covered the basics of structure of **algae, ferns, grasses, palms, cycads and then soft and hard woods**. It is hard to condense into a small article what we covered from Fri. 6:00-9:00pm, Sat. 8:30am-9:00pm, and Sun. 8:30am-5:00pm. Just let me say that it is well worth the time to be able to read, take notes during the lecture portion, ask **Walt** questions and wait for his Encyclopedic reservoir of knowledge and experience answer, view slides (50X-200X) of specimens as well as handle the same as they are passed around to each student. The effect is to appeal to all of ones senses and thus the Socratic learning style more than reinforces the knowledge level each one of us received. We thought we knew how to pick petrified palm specimens but when we first viewed the horsetail grass tube with a living piece and compared it to a petrified piece, it was truly an eye (and mind) opening experience. The level of detail within the various specimens showed such a high level of design you were amazed at each piece viewed. I especially liked the petrified piece of *Glossopteris* stem as it showed a perfectly formed hexagonally divided root tube. The portion on Conifers was interesting as well since now we can deduce the actual seasonal growth shown on a slice by the **resin canals and rays**.

I have many more notes with drawings and specific names of specimen's passed by us (with mini-diagrams) but it was too much to put in this small article. Suffice it to say that I believe everyone enjoyed themselves as well as elevated their Petrified Wood Identification knowledge. Many thanks to **Walt** for his first Barstow Seminar. **Vivian Watts, Peggy Haines, and Barabara Bilyeu** manned the book and supplies table for all attendees. Special thanks also are due to **Tricia Sheppard** and **Peggy** for all the behind the scenes coordinating, mailing, phone calls, scheduling and set-up/clean up after the Seminar. **Danny and Vivian Watts** and **Katie Boyd** also contributed that 'extra effort' by assisting throughout the Seminar.

Sperry Wash (October 20-21, 2008)

Trip Leader: Walt Wright

There were **16** attendees of MDGMS's first **Walt Wright** Petrified Wood Identification Seminar that opted to go on the Sperry Wash fieldtrip.

We convoyed first to Baker, for a break and snack, then to the Sarasota Springs area to see the (*Chevron* - my name for them) mountains and the actual mini-lakes, which had different **grasses** and other plant life in this remote oasis. There were small samples of '**algae balls**' found in this area as well. Then we drove to and through Tacopa, past the China Ranch (I'd like to stop there some time in the future), stopping at the Western Talc mine to set up camp.

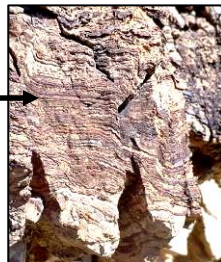


Leaving there, we took a very old and beat up road to the actual Sperry Wash area. Then we began our search for **grasses**, and **palm fiber**, **roots** and '**parts**' (ask **Tricia** to show you her Pet '**Peduncle**'). Several people found lovely specimens of the '**Pink Palm fiber**' and looking at it under our loops it is startling what you can see and it lets you know how rare it is! Others, under the tutelage of **Walt**, and with the new found knowledge of '**what to look for**' and '**what it should look like**' when you do find it - found the very grasses he showed us in class, in another area of the Wash. Other finds were; **palm roots**, **petrified grass clusters**, **petrified palm fronds** and other **palm fiber** specimens.



Back at the campsite, we also found carving sized specimens of **Soapstone** - thanks to **Danny**. There were also small specimens of the **algae layered fossils** (oldest in

California) at the Alexander Hills formation (next to our campsite - humm, imagine that coincidence)!☺ **Walt** gave extensive lecture here (see below). The weather was absolutely perfect for both days of hunting and everyone found something to his or her liking and the views were panoramic and spectacular!

### STATE FIFE & DRUM CORPS

The California State *Fife and Drum Corps* was adopted by legislature on June 19, 1997. Formed in 1965, it is a consolidation of the *Fort Sutter Fife and Drum Corps*, the *Field Music of the National Civil War Association*, and the *Fife and Drum Corps of the Re-enactors of the American Civil War*.

Their mission is "to perpetuate the historical significance and folk traditions of fife and drum music and to foster the spirit of fellowship among fifers and drummers everywhere."

As colorful as they are musical, their authentic performances are done in period costume using traditional wooden fifes and rope-tensioned drums.



During the American Revolution, Civil War, and other significant events in history, fife and drum music "roused and inspired" soldiers. After World War I it became a thing of the past in California.
